# 2018 GRADUATION PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS Information for Incoming Grade 10s

#### **SUMMARY OF GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

To graduate with a dogwood diploma, students must earn a minimum of 80 credits, of which:

48 credits come from required courses (12 courses in total)

12 credits must come from grade 12 level elective courses (3 courses)

4 credits from the required Career Life Connections and Capstone 12

16 remaining credits from either grade 11 or 12 elective choices (4 courses)

#### **ELECTIVE COURSE CREDITS**

Students must earn a minimum of **28** credits of elective choices. 12 credits (3 courses) must be at the grade 12 level. Neither Communications or English 12 count as one of these courses.

## **CAREER LIFE CONNECTIONS:** (4 credits)

This requirement will replace Graduation Transitions. Students will receive information on how they can meet this requirement in the fall of 2018.

#### **GRADUATION ASSESSMENTS:**

- 1. **Graduation Numeracy Assessment:** All students will be required to write this assessment at least once before graduation, but may write it up to three times. It is not tied to any course, and is designed to measure student proficiency in numeracy. Grade 10 students will be given the opportunity to write this assessment in their grade 10 year.
- 2. Graduation Literacy Assessment: This assessment will be implemented in the 2019/20 school year, and will replace the English 12 provincial exam that students currently write. Like the numeracy assessment, it will not be tied to a course. All students will be required to write this assessment at least once prior to graduation, but may write it up to three times.

Students will receive information about the numeracy assessment in the fall of 2018. Once plans for the literacy assessment have been formalized, this information will be shared with students.
